What will be studied	History of the origin and formation of NATO. Structural organization of the North Atlantic Alliance. The main activities of NATO. NATO enlargement. NATO's cooperation with international organizations and Partner countries. NATO peacekeeping. NATO's activities in the fight against terrorism, cybercrime, etc. threats. NATO programs. NATO's role in ensuring international and European security. Ukraine's relations with NATO.
Why it is interesting / necessary to study	NATO is an effective system of collective defense. Given that joining NATO is a strategic goal for Ukraine, we need to know where we are integrating. In order to have a reasoned and convincing opinion on this issue in the referendum on Ukraine's accession to NATO and not to choose the answer - "I don't know"!

To be able to differentiate the powers and functions of the Alliance's political, military and civilian committees. To describe NATO's activities in the international arena, and the peculiarities of its cooperation with Partner countries. To know the basic criteria for joining NATO. To assess likely scenarios for NATO enlargement. To participate in discussions on NATO activities. To work in mini-groups to achieve the goals of analytical work on Euro-Atlantic integration. To be able to find the necessary information from different sources, organize it, to assess its reliability, to explain its significance, to make informed decisions.</p>
